1. The Filter Media Keeps Changing Over The Years

The filter media has changed a lot in the last 50 years. The early filters used cloth as the filter media material. In the 1940s, manufacturers switched to a paper element. That evolved into a mix of paper and synthetic fibers. Now, some filters are made from steel mesh.

Even though oil filter media has evolved a lot over the years, it's still not perfect today. For example, some oil filters are made of a blend of paper and fiberglass. That material is easy to tear off. If that happens, the material will contaminate the oil, and can clog oil passageways. This will damage components inside the engine.

2. Oil Filters Have Bypass Valves And Anti-Drain Back Valves Now

Oil filters used to have a simple design. They were just a metal container with filter material inside. Now, a modern oil filter has two addtional important parts:

1. A bypass valve

An anti-drain back valve

When the oil filter media gets too clogged up, the bypass valve allows the dirty oil to pass through to the engine. This is because dirty oil is better than no oil for the engine. An anti-drain back valve prevents the oil from draining out of the filter when the engine is off. This helps oil flow to where it's needed faster once you turn the engine on. Without the anti-drainback valve, the oil filter would take a couple seconds to fill when you start the engine, and critical components would be without oil for that period of time.

3. Some Oil Filters Contain Magnets Now

Sometimes tiny metal particles will end up in the motor oil. It happens when two metal parts grind against each other without enough lubrication. Oil that's contaminated with metal particles will ruin the engine. Regular filter media can't catch these very small metal particles.

That's why some modern oil filters contain magnets. These magnets collect the metal particles in the oil. Regular disposable oil filters don't have magnets, though. But some high-end reusable oil filters do.

Old Business – The Swap Meet was discussed. Pat reported that several of the people who helped have stepped up to help again next year. Bonnie will call and recruit volunteers for various positions, Dana will again chair the vendor liaison post, Ron Muhleman will coordinate food vendor truck(s), Lynn will be in charge of the coffee kitchen.

It was mentioned that only the volunteers who have been issued a name tag (as they are signed up to staff a position) will be allowed in to the Presidents Hall.

Any others will have to pay the \$5 fee. This should encourage members to step up and volunteer! Dana reported she has a waiting list of vendors that want a table next year if swap meet is held. It was **Board Members Present**; Pat Ward – President, Pete discussed that we need our letter (contract) with the vendors to include that they cannot break up their spaces until the end of the show! Too many left early this time. This will include a need for staff to monitor vendor's trying to tear down early. It was also mentioned we need a person manning the stack of tables to insure only those vendors with the slip of paper from Dana are allowed to take their number of tables. We will cut hours back to 4PM for closing. If vendors insist on leaving, they will be told they are no longer welcome to participate.

Dale Wilkins suggested the Boy Scouts if we get their agreement to help with Swap Meet. It was decided that we won't include the Boy Scouts in this discussion, and will instead add them to our Swap Meet meetings. After discussion a motion was made/seconded to send \$500 to each of the following; Kitsap Sun Bellringer, Hospice of Kitsap County, and Holly Ridge Center. Motion carried.

We Got Pills -by Jim Barnes


I sit in the waiting room where we seldom talk
